Poke O Moonshine: The weekend of July 28-30, 2017 will see the celebration of the Centennial of the Poke-O-Moonshine fire tower and the 20th Anniversary of The Friends of Poke-O-Moonshine. Friday, July 28 at 5 PM, the juried Poke-O-Moonshine Art Exhibit will open at 1719 Block Gallery, Keeseville. On Sunday, July 30th there will be a hike to Poke-O-Moonshine summit and fire tower. Meet at the summit at 1 PM to tour the tower, eat lunch, and enjoy singing by the Essex-based singers, The Wannabees. Between 3 and 4 PM, gather at the Campground at the base of Poke-O-Moonshine for cake and speeches by some who have been closely involved in the history and restoration of the fire tower at Poke-O and fire towers on other mountains. Stillwater: I had this segment all ready to go when the Friends announced they were all set - All summit steward dates are booked!!!



CENTENNIAL TOWER

In 1917, the State decided to replace the wooden tower on Mt Adams with a more substantial structure, a 47 foot Aeromotor LS 40 steel tower. It was shipped by train, then trucked to the base of the mountain. From there, horses did the work of getting it to the summit, part of the way. Holes were drilled in the bedrock to secure the fire tower footings. Then according to DEC Engineer Kinne Williams, the tower began to grow and take shape. See the attached pdf article – Putting Eyes in the Sky from the August 1946 Conservationist magazine. I can only imagine the ride when it “became desirable to hike along after the truck”.

A cabin was originally built at the base of the tower, a crude wooden affair. In 1922 a standard 12' x 16' foot cabin was built, but it was located at the base of the mountain, a stiff climb and a mile away. The Observer's of old likely did not think much of the daily commute to work! During a visit in 2004 the cabin was in poor condition. It has since received some love and is accessible once again.



The tower was decommissioned in 1970. Restoration initially occurred in 2004, but subsequently the roof was blown off in 2008. In 2010, the ADKHP Foundation under the watchful eyes of Jack Coleman, signed an agreement with the DEC and donated funds to the restoration project. Among other items to be completed were fabricating a new roof off site, thoughtfully created to reduce the chance of the wind getting under it ever again. While the roof was helicoptered in with DEC support – and installed in the summer of 2011, other materials came in on the backs of volunteers. Concrete and water had to be carried to the top for the footing repair. Windows and maps, paint and other items also came by trail. The trail included fording the mighty Hudson and Lake Jimmy. Restoration was finally completed in 2013. The ADKHP Foundation continues to maintain the fire tower and the trail to it. Thank you ADKHP and Jack Coleman for restoring this beautiful tower with outstanding views of the High Peaks of the Adirondacks!

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
