The Civilian Conservation Corps: Last month I included 2 books of the month; *Another Day, Another Dollar* by Diane Galusha and *Adirondack CCC Camps* by Marty Podskoch. These two books provide the reader with wonderful recollections of the amazing work that the CCC did in NYS. The men were involved in building towers, fire tower cabins, fire ponds, actual fire fighting, reforestation of burned over areas, stringing of telephone lines and more. While many of the men came to the CCC without any particular skills, they learned many and took great pride in their work. Others came with great expertise and found the CCC a good place to use those skills. This photo of the Azure Mt. Observer's cabin in 1936 illustrates exceptional masonry work very well and like the very similar DeBar photo, includes well done chimneys too.

The Paul Smith's camp built the Observer's cabin on DeBar and a new phone line to the summit. I love the photograph of the wooden stairs to the fire tower on Ampersand that the CCC built that is on page 273 of Marty's book. The Rock Rift, Page Pond and Gilbert Lake fire towers were built by the men from the Laurens and Davenport camps. The Breakabeen camp built the Utsayantha fire tower. Kelly Hollow in the Catskills is described well in Diane's book on page 142 with the fire ponds still remaining intact to this day. I strongly recommend reading both of these books to discover more of the CCC connections to fire towers.





OBSERVER'S CABIN

Books of the month repeated:





- ① Only one tower has the same name as its township.
- ② Of the two towers closest in elevation, Stamford's is the higher of the two.
- ③ Overlook Mtn. Tower is exactly 400 feet higher in elevation than Shandaken's tower.
- ④ Hardenburgh's tower is higher than Mt. Utsayantha, which is higher than Claryville's tower, which is higher than Tremper Mountain tower.
- ⑤ The towers in Woodstock and Hardenburgh and Utsayantha tower are all higher than 3000 feet, but none of them is over 4000 feet.
- ⑥ Balsam Lake tower is not in Claryville or Woodstock; Overlook Mtn is not in Hardenburgh
- ⑦ Red Hill tower is 150 feet lower than the Overlook Mtn tower.

Corrections Department: Last month we featured Black and Gore as our centennial towers. Included in that feature was a postcard of a wooden tower on Black Mountain dated 1911. After posting that same photograph on our Facebook page, it was brought to my attention that the same photograph has also been identified as Black Mountain Fire Tower in New Hampshire. I asked our research sleuths what they thought. This included Retired Forest Ranger Paul Hartmann, Author Marty Podskoch and NH bookstore owner Steve Smith. It appears that it is very possible it was the NH tower, not NY, but without actually seeing the postcard, we may never know for certain. Do any of you happen to have that postcard? If so, please let me know.

When I was a youngster I had the privilege of growing up on top of a mountain where my father was a fire lookout. We lived on the mountain for nine seasons, and my unique experience gave me a special insight into the complexities of many of Nature's secrets.

One of the things I remember most (and looked forward to as a growing boy) was the hundreds of hikers that visited the mountaintop each summer. People of all ages would venture up the trail, sometimes in swarms, sometimes in tiny family groups, and often solo climbers. Focal point for everyone was the lookout tower where they could register their names, visit with my father, and ask questions. Included among the hikers were many boys' and girls' camps – kids from the cities, many climbing their very first mountain, and you can imagine the questions they had on their mind. And here was my father, first priority, guardian of the forest, but second and probably more significant, public relations expert and sole representative of the conservation institution.

The people who went away from that mountain went with a greater understanding of the system and a genuine respect for our forests and parks. And the young campers took back a unique gift – a deep appreciation for the values nature has provided – all because a single man was there to answer their inquisitive questions.
