Red Hill Fire Tower: On Saturday, May 4th, Doug Hamilton the Coordinator at Red Hill, held a volunteer luncheon at the Claryville Fire Hall to thank all those who give so much to the fire tower. About 25 people were in attendance, including the local Forest Ranger, Howard Kreft, and NYSDEC Forester George Profous, who will be speaking at our conference. Discussions were held about Red Hill's 100th Anniversary that will be celebrated next year. Azure: Azure Mountain Friends are currently reviewing the submissions for their \$750 scholarships awards. To be considered, students must submit a brief essay (250 words) on "Why I would like to be an AMF Summit Steward for five days in the summer." Each year as funds allow, the Friends group offers this scholarship to three college-bound high school seniors from area high schools or current college students. Scholarship winners are then expected to serve as summit stewards at the restored fire tower on five separate weekend days between Memorial Day Weekend and Columbus Day 2019. Winners will be trained by experienced stewards.

Poke O Moonshine: Friends of Poke O Moonshine welcome new fire tower steward Thomas Gamsjager for the 2019 season. Tom brings lots of experience to his role and will be on duty Thursdays through Mondays from June 14th to August 25th.

St. Regis: Here is an update on some monumental work. From Doug F. - "The braces are all installed. The contractor and I went up last Sunday to make sure everything made it through the winter. He and his crew worked an additional three long days, hiking up and down in the dark. I worked with them two of the days. We had a few other volunteers helping too. They finished [the 3rd night] at 7:30 PM, then hiked out. We hope to fly the tools and maybe the old braces off the summit on Thursday." THANK YOU!

We cleaned and repaired all the water bars on the way up, and then got the Observer's Cabin ready to be opened up shortly. Back in late November, I got word that the tower cabin and observer's cabin had both been broken into. I went up and repaired them

both, and didn't find anything amiss. Saturday we discovered that the vandals stole the brand new cot out of the cabin. This is the second one that has been stolen. The vandals had brought a lot of tools with them, and had spent a lot of time and energy breaking in. They also had to carry the cot back down the mountain. They probably could have spent the same amount of energy working at a job and bought a cot. Don't they realize that it is just volunteers and donations that are buying these items and repairing their mischief?"

Jackie Jones: Someone seriously vandalized the newly refurbished Jackie Jones fire tower. The Park took immediate action to make repairs.

Ferncliff: With a HUGE THANK YOU to Margaret A., we were able to spend Earth Day painting over significant graffiti on Ferncliff Fire Tower. Thank you Margaret – what an improvement!


April 2019 Newsletter Follow Up: The discussion about springs had Bill Tindall from Kempshall remembering hauling water - "The spring for Kempshall Mt tower was located a moderate distance down the opposite side of the mountain from the access trail. Given the fact that water runs and percolates down hill, springs are always a hike down from the mountain top. We hauled water in gallon wine jugs. However, the bed rock at the top of the mountain had depressions that collected rain water. This water was used for washing dishes, etc. As a young boy I don't remember washing myself much."

Book of the Month: *Hiking the Trail to Yesterday* by William (Bill) Hill is an excellent addition to your library. Subtitled *A Collection of Northern NY Hikes and Their Histories*, you will find several fire towers within the pages, some still standing and some long gone; Cat, Stillwater, Tooley Pond, and Cathead to mention a few. Take a walk with Bill to these places, enjoy his descriptions, history and great photographs along the way. Here is short excerpt:

"In 1911, Catamount Mountain joined the growing list of Fire Tower peaks. The first tower was a wooden structure, a log-framed pyramid with planks spaced on the sides for support and to work as a ladder. There was no cab on top of the tower."



Guidelines for the 6th Annual Lighting of the Fire Tower Event Statewide: The original premise for the Lighting of the Fire Tower Event came from Doug Hamilton of the Red Hill Fire Tower Committee. The idea was to light the fire tower with a high powered light, put lots of press releases in the local paper about the time when this would occur and invite people to go to locations around the community where they could look up, see the light on the horizon and remember that there was a fire tower there watching over and protecting the community and surrounding forest.

To ensure a safe event and in keeping with the spirit and purpose of the event, please plan on the following:

- a If there is a specific fire tower that you would like to light, please reach out to the group that maintains that fire tower. If in doubt, let me know and I can point you to the right person. Please let me know so I can maintain an up to date list of the fire towers that will be lit.
- b Work with the individual fire tower group to reach out to the local press, distribute flyers, etc about the event. Include locations on the ground in the community where people can look up and see the tower lit. Utilize http://heywhatsthat.com or other similar web pages to determine locations.
- c Discuss with the fire tower group the type of light to be used and who will be the Illuminator.
- d If you choose to organize a hike to the fire tower, please be sure to go as a group with proper gear, head lamps, etc. Hiking in the dark can be difficult and unsafe for the inexperienced hiker.
- e Please light the lamp for the specified time period; 9-9:30 pm.
- f Please report back to myself and the fire tower group how the event went and that all are off the mountain safely.

Fire Tower Restoration specializes in acquiring, dismantling, restoring and re-erecting historic Forest Fire Observation Towers. We are based in Bloomingdale, NY where the restoration work is performed. We have had past projects in seventeen states to date. This year we have major projects in: New York State: Install an 80 foot Fire Tower, 2 weeks; Near Manchester, NH: Install a 100 foot Fire Tower, 4 weeks; Near Baxter State Park, Western Maine: Install an 80 foot Fire Tower, 4 weeks; On Hurricane Mountain in the Adirondacks: Install a new roof on 40 foot Fire Tower.

Some projects include travel to various locations and may require camping on site for extended periods. When working locally, hours will be as needed, 20 to 40 hours per week. When traveling for out-of-town projects, work can be 40 to 60 hours per week. Our work season this year will wind up in December. We can use you through the Summer months and longer if you are available into December. We also have Winter projects.
