


## Forest Fire Lookout Association New York State Chapter August 2017

### Updates



Visit their website and click on their volunteer calendar: <http://www.friendsofstregis.org/> Here is a bit of follow up from their July 10<sup>th</sup> meeting: Friends and interested folks gathered on July 10, 2107 at the Historic Saranac Lake, John Black room to view a powerpoint presentation about past restoration efforts and to learn of plans for the future. Photographer Mark Kurtz bought along some large prints of the panoramic vistas from the tower which will be printed on sturdy material and installed in the cab to allow identification of the surrounding topography. Dr. Ed Hixson of Upper St. Regis Lake, Jack Burke of Paul Smiths and Bob Marrone of Vermontville have been elected to the Friends Board of Directors. Marty Podskoch delivered a very entertaining and personable presentation at the Paul Smith's Visitor's Interpretive Center (VIC) on July 23, 2017. Although the tower is open, there is still a great deal of restoration work to complete before the tower is completely preserved for future generations. The Friends are currently working on a grant to be submitted to the Cloudsplitter Foundation to raise money for the complete replacement of all the diagonal cross braces (24).

**Catskill Fire Tower Project:** On Saturday night September 2nd, we invite everyone to find a place with a view of your favorite fire tower for our 4th annual **Lighting of the Fire Towers Event**. This event is meant to showcase the history of the five Catskill fire towers and some of our other friends around the state. Find an area in your neighborhood where you have a view of one of the fire towers. From 9:00pm to 9:30pm, look up to see the cabs lit up. Remember that these towers were watching faithfully like beacons over your property for years to help prevent forest fires. The men and women who were in those cabs were there to protect your property from forest fires by providing fire fighters with an early detection and reporting system that was amazingly accurate. If you are lucky, your area may have been covered by more than one tower! Loon Lake Fire Tower is our centennial tower of the month. This area of the northwestern Adirondacks was the location of several forest fires. In 1903, 1908, and 1913 several fires spread. A wooden tower was initially erected on the site (does anyone have a photo of same?). In 1917 under the watchful eye of Forest Ranger Albert Tebeau, the current 35 foot Aeromotor fire tower was erected. The headlines from March 1928 read “The tower that was erected on the Mountain by the state was blown down and wrecked in a heavy windstorm which tore over the mountain some days ago.” The tower was restored that very spring as it had such an important coverage area. The first standard cabin was also erected that year. The tower was in service through 1971. In October of 2013 NYSDEC and the SCA constructed and opened a new 2.8 mile trail to the summit.

She still stands proudly one hundred years later, though looking pretty poorly at the moment. In a recent conversation with a NYSDEC Supervising Forester about another tower, he added “we’ll do Loon Lake next” to our conversation, so perhaps in the near future she will get spruced up.



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
